## Minister's Message

As Minister Responsible for Sport, I am pleased to recognize the contributions of the Sport North Federation and its member Territorial Sport Organizations. It has been an extremely busy year advancing sport initiatives in the Northwest Territories to help northerners choose healthier lifestyles.

Last year marked a significant amount of work to prepare for several major multi-sport games. In November 2006, I was pleased to announce a major change to the Arctic Winter Games Regional Trials process. By moving the Regional Trials to one year ahead of the 2008 Arctic Winter Games in Yellowknife, more communities can make use of their natural ice facilities for training. Communities without a year-round road will also be able to travel to their Regional Trials using the winter road system, which will give more athletes a chance to represent the Northwest Territories.

From February 15 to 18, 2007, all eyes were on the Village of Fort Simpson for the NWT Winter Games. The NWT Games are a tremendous opportunity for youth from all communities in the Northwest Territories to experience a multi-sport event. I was pleased to be able to attend the Opening Ceremonies with a number of my colleagues from the Legislative Assembly who were there to support the youth from their constituencies. I extend my sincere thanks to the Sport North

Federation, the Territorial Sport Organizations, the Village of Fort Simpson and to all the volunteers who made this event possible.

For the North, the 2007 Jeux du Canada Winter Games in Whitehorse, Yukon, was a special opportunity to showcase our territories. As part of the Pan North Program, involving Nunavut, the Northwest Territories, Yukon and the Canada Games Host Society, we delivered a Dene Games and Arctic Sports competition, a Youth Ambassador program, a Torch Relay for all northern communities, and a dynamic arts and culture program. The Northwest Territories also ran NWT House, which turned into one of the premier "places to be" during the Games.

Throughout the year there were many smaller, but equally important sport programs delivered such as skill clinics, camps, leagues, tournaments, and coaching and officiating courses. These initiatives and the NWT sport system depend heavily on the contributions of volunteers who deserve our heartfelt thanks for their efforts to build healthier communities.

## Highlights

### NWT Games

The third set of NWT Games was hosted in Fort Simpson from February 15 to 18, 2007. A total of 276 participants from 27 communities attended this event. Over the three days, kids experienced a wide variety of sports – badminton, basketball, broomball, cross-country skiing, Dene games, snowboarding and speed skating.

The NWT Games is a great opportunity for young athletes, age 10 to 14, to learn a variety of sports. Qualified instructors worked with the kids to introduce them to each sport in a fun, learning environment. It is our hope that the NWT Games will encourage kids to embark on a lifetime of sport, physical activity and healthy lifestyles.

### High Performance Athlete Grant

The Department of Municipal and Community Affairs (GNWT) and Sport North joined resources to establish the High Performance Athlete Grant. This grant provides financial support to high performance athletes from the Northwest Territories. Sixteen grants were distributed this year:

## Canada Winter Games

This is the first time that the Canada Games have been hosted in northern Canada and our team is one of the largest that we have ever sent. The 156 members of our team represent our territories' finest young athletes and dedicated coaches, managers and mission staff.

Our athletes participated in badminton, biathlon, cross-country skiing, curling, figure skating, gymnastics, hockey, shooting, snowboarding, speed skating and squash. Team NWT had outstanding results from: Brendan Green, who won a Gold medal in cross-country skiing; Jill Gilday, 6th overall in speed skating; and Andrew Matthews, 5th overall in snowboarding. This is the best performance that Team NWT has had at a Canada Games.

## Rising Star

The Rising Star program provides funding to athletes (14 years of age and under) to attend sport specific camps outside the NWT. This program encourages younger athletes to stay involved in sport and access southern training opportunities, facilities and coaches.

This year, 16 applicants were approved for funding (8 female, 8 male).





### Silent Auction and Raffle


In May 2006, the KidSport™ silent auction and raffle, held during the Sport North Awards Banquet, raised \$3,277.
